Foundation Stage— Primary 1 & 2



Starting School in the Foundation Stage

Primary 1 & 2, known as 'The Foundation Stage', aims to build on children's pre-school learning experiences. It provides each child with an appropriate learning programme to develop their disposition to learn. It also aims to provide them with the skills and competencies they will need to succeed in school and future life.

The Foundation Stage endorses good early years practice where teachers have more flexibility in terms of the topics they teach. This flexibility allows teachers to follow the interests of the children, encouraging them to see links in their learning and to appreciate that the skills they learn in one area can be applied elsewhere in their learning.

Key Stages 1 & 2

Children at Key Stages 1 and 2 build on and develop the experiences provided at the Foundation Stage. Emphasis continues to be placed on your child's personal, social & emotional development as well an emphasis on the development of the skills of 'Communication', 'Using Mathematics', 'Using ICT' and 'Thinking Skills and Personal Capabilities'.

Children are provided with opportunities to develop these skills through a range of worthwhile, challenging, relevant and enjoyable learning experiences across the curriculum.

Language and Literacy



Literacy is a key to learning. In St. Mary's Primary School, we will focus on developing your child's ability to understand and use language as an integral part of learning.



'Language and Literacy' is taught through the three main areas of talking and listening, reading and writing. Your child's knowledge, skills and understanding are developed within an integrated programme that connects language and literacy work to the broader curriculum. We strive to ensure that each child can express themselves creatively, communicate confidently and interact effectively with the world around them.

Mathematics and Numeracy

Numeracy is a life skill necessary in making everyday decisions and of use in virtually every work context. Skills in numeracy should help your child make informed and responsible choices and decisions throughout their lives. Here in St. Mary's Primary School, mathematical ideas are developed by making use of practical materials and electronic resources and by exploring various mathematical processes.

Activities are provided for your child in the areas of 'Number', 'Measures', 'Shape and Space' and 'Handling Data'. Our children engage in a wide range of purposeful activities which involve them in different modes of mathematical learning, including playing, exploring and investigating, doing and observing, talking and listening, asking questions, reflecting, drafting, reading and recording.



The World Around Us



We believe that children are innately imaginative and creative so these dispositions are valued and nurtured in the school by providing your child with exciting and relevant contexts for their learning.

At St. Mary's Primary School we provide our children with opportunities to ask questions about themselves and the nature of the world around them. Children learn about how things work and about the characteristics of the natural world, through investigation and discovery.



The Arts

In St. Mary's PS the children's creativity is developed through every area of the curriculum and closely linked with all aspects of their learning.

Art and Design, Drama and Music, known as 'The Arts',



provide many opportunities for developing this creativity. Children are encouraged to express their ideas and feelings in a variety of ways with the aim that their individuality, imagination and creativity will develop during their years in primary school.

Physical Education



The purpose of Physical Education is to provide the opportunity for specific attention to be given to the physical development, health and well-being of your child.

Children experience a sense of fun, enjoyment and achievement through a variety of progressively challenging activities in P.E.

Children develop a variety of physical skills and are encouraged to participate in many individual and team sports including Dance, Gymnastics, Athletics, Games and Swimming.



Personal Development & Mutual Understanding



The development of high self-esteem and self-confidence among children and staff is very important at St. Mary's Primary School. 'Personal Development and Mutual Understanding', as a distinct Area of Learning, focuses on encouraging your child to become personally, emotionally and socially effective, to lead healthy, safe and fulfilled lives and to become confident, independent and responsible citizens.

Through a variety of learning experiences, pupils are encouraged to develop their self-confidence and self-esteem, to think about moral values and to develop their personal and interpersonal skills.

Religious Education

We aim to develop the distinctive Catholic ethos of our school, to enrich the spiritual and moral development of your child and to foster links with the Parish of Donaghmore. We assist parents in for **Sacraments** preparing children the of Reconciliation, First Communion and Confirmation, recognising that parents are key educators of their children particularly in the areas of faith and We endeavour to develop each child's religion. sense of confidence in his/her own identity and an understanding and respect for traditions other than his/her own.



Assessing Your Child's Progress

Assessment is an integral part of the learning process. The school will monitor your child's progress carefully through a range of assessment techniques and strategies. For children with special needs, a comprehensive programme of class-based teacher support is available, with termly Education Plan meetings.

As parents, you will be kept fully informed of your child's progress. The school will assess and report annually on your child's progress in:

- Areas of Learning;
- Cross-Curricular Skills; and
- Thinking Skills and Personal Capabilities.

This will be done through Parent/Teacher meetings in term 1 and a written report in term 3.



General Information



SCHOOL UNIFORM

HEALTHY BREAKS- MILK & FRUIT

The school promotes a healthy break. Children may have water or milk and/or fresh fruit/ crackers daily, which we ask parents to pay for in advance on a monthly basis. Toast is provided on Fridays. Prices are communicated to parents at the start of each school year/ term and updated when needed.



SCHOOL MEALS

Menus are sent home at the start of each month for the month ahead. Parents are requested to send in dinner money on a Monday morning if possible. Again, prices are communicated to parents at the start of each school year and updated when needed.

SCHOOL TRIPS

During the course of the school year, children have the opportunity to participate in events outside of school. For any such external trip or visit, the school must seek written consent from parents for each individual trip. These permission slips are then retained in school for record-keeping purposes.



WHAT HAPPENS WHEN A CHILD FEELS UNWELL IN SCHOOL

Should your child feel unwell in school, the school will contact you to let you know and, if necessary, arrange for collection. It is therefore vitally important that the school has up-to-date contact details for all parents— as well as a contact number in case of Emergency. It is the policy of our school to make contact with parents should your child receive a bump to the head. It is then left to parents' own discretion whether the child stays in school or is taken home.

FIRST AID

Mrs Majella McCann, Mrs Paula McStravog and Mrs Cathy Morgan are trained to deliver First Aid in the event of any emergency.

SCHOOL HOURS AND COLLECTION ARRANGEMENTS

School begins at 9.00 am. As pupils are not insured to be on the school premises before 8.45am in the morning, parents should be aware that supervision is not in place before this time. Therefore, parents are asked to assist us with this matter by making necessary arrangements.



School finishes at 2.00pm for children in P1-P2 and at 3.00pm for children in P3-P7. For safety reasons, parents are asked to collect their child/children *in person* at the school gate as teachers on supervision duty may not release children to walk unaccompanied along the road. All staff appreciate your co-operation with this important safety matter. For those parents who wish their child/children to walk home, this must be made known to the school in writing at the start of each term. Prompt collection of pupils at 2.00pm and 3.00pm is also very much appreciated as this allows staff to continue with planned school development work/meetings promptly.

VISITORS TO THE SCHOOL

All visitors to the school - **including parents** - are kindly asked to report to reception if needing to pass on a message or to see a child or teacher during the school day. This monitoring helps the school maintain Child Protection requirements by knowing who is on the premises at any given time. All who work in school appreciate your co-operation with this important matter.

SCHOOL NEWSLETTERS & TEXT MESSAGING SERVICE

At the start of each month, the school sends a Newsletter home to keep parents up-to-date with all that is happening in school. This is also a nice way of celebrating achievements in school. The school will also keep parents informed using the school's text messaging service.

ATTENDANCE

Where pupils are absent from school for one day or more, parents are asked to send in a short note to the Class Teacher to explain the absence. The date and reason for the absence must be recorded by the Teacher on the attendance sheet and this is also recorded centrally on the school's information management system (SIMS). Assistance in this matter is appreciated as attendance patterns are closely monitored by the school's EA Education Welfare Officer.

If children need to be taken out of school to attend appointments, parents are asked to sign their child out and in, in the secretary's office, for Child Protection requirements.

SCHOOL POLICIES

The Principal, Teaching Staff and Board of Governors of St. Mary's Primary School will determine school policies in accordance with the guidance provided by the Department of Education. We have a range of policies and procedures followed by all members of staff to ensure the safety and wellbeing of all our pupils. Copies are made available to parents routinely and on request.

LANGUAGE & MUSIC LEARNING

Mrs McConnell provides Irish language lessons to all children from P3-7 and tin whistle lessons to all children in P3-7. Pupils in P5-7 receive Mandarin Chinese lessons from a Chinese tutor, through funding from South West College, Dungannon.

Parental and Community Involvement

While our school recognises parents as the prime educators of their child, we encourage a partnership approach between home, school and parish for the benefit of our pupils.

The school benefits from an extremely pro-active Board of Governors and an enthusiastic, supportive Parents' Support Group which organises fundraising events during each school year. It is important to us that the school is an integral and dynamic part of the community. In order to achieve this, we continue to reach out into the community, inviting individuals and groups to support the life and work of the school.

What can St. Mary's PS offer your child?

Strong Pastoral Care

We recognise that good relationships between all the members of the school community are vital in fostering a caring school. We provide a safe, caring and supportive environment in which all children at St. Mary's Primary School can flourish.



The behaviour of our children is excellent - a perfect environment in which to learn. Reflecting the ethos of our school, we place emphasis on positive behaviour and so help children to develop:

- responsibility and self-discipline through our positive discipline policy;
- respect for themselves, others and property of others;
- a work ethic and ability to co-operate with others;
- a caring, polite and friendly approach to others.

Meeting Individual Needs



We believe that every child should have the opportunity to succeed. Teachers, therefore, provide a programme of work for all children which is appropriate to their age and stage of development. We aim to identify specific learning difficulties or special talents as early as possible and cater for them. Annual screening takes place to ensure children are performing according to their ability. The school liaises closely with external agencies to support each child's individual needs and involves parents at all stages.

Enriched Provision

Our pupils have the opportunity to experience a range of extracurricular activities. We offer children the chance to learn other languages; Irish (P3-7) and Mandarin Chinese(P5-7). P3-7 children learn tin whistle. We maximise the expertise and skills of individual teachers to extend children's experiences in using technology, STEM, Sport, Dance and Drama. EA music tutor delivers weekly violin lessons.





After School Clubs

With the introduction of After School Clubs, pupils from P1-P7 may now avail of a range of clubs from Monday to Thursday in each term of the year. Visiting tutors - alongside existing staff - deliver and support activities such as Music, Basketball, Arts & Crafts, Cookery, Drama and Dance. Strong links have been made with local artists, tutors and the University of Ulster Sports Outreach Programme. All those who work with our pupils are vetted in line with Department of Education guidelines.

What makes St. Mary's PS unique?

Being a small, rural school, all members of staff get to know each and every child on an individual basis. There is a 'family' feel to all we do. A particular strength of our school is the small class size. With an extremely favourable teacher:pupil ratio of one teacher to every seventeen pupils on average, more time and attention is available to support each child's learning and individual needs. Our highly trained classroom assistants support this level of attention even further.

In our school, children are grouped according to their ability and needs within each class. Our composite classes support this differentiation even further. Within our mixed age classes, children are grouped in such a way to ensure they have an appropriate amount of challenge or support. For example, if a child needs to be stretched, s/he can work with children from a different year/ higher ability group. Alternatively, children who need further reinforcement can work with children from a medium or lower ability group or even children from the previous year group. In this way, all the needs of our children are catered for fully.

ADMISSION

If the school's admission and enrolment numbers have not been reached, the school will admit all children of the appropriate age whose parents wish them to attend the school. These children are those of compulsory school age (children who reach their fourth birthday on or before 1 July 2017).

ADMISSION CRITERIA

The Principal, on behalf of Board of Governors, will apply the following criteria to identify which children should be admitted either at initial admission to education or on transfer from another school. In selecting children for admission children resident in Northern Ireland at the time of their proposed admission to the school will be selected for admission to the school before any child not so resident.

- 1 Children of compulsory school age and who normally reside in the Parish of Donaghmore
- 2 Children of compulsory school age from other areas.

In the event of oversubscription in any one of the criteria taken in order, the following sub criteria will be applied in the order set down.

- (i) Children who have brothers/sister presently enrolled in the school.
- (ii) Children whose parent/guardian, brother/sister are prior pupils of the school.
- (iii) Children whose parent/guardian are presently permanent members of the school's teaching and ancillary staff.
- (iv) Children who are the eldest child in the family
- (v) The remaining places will be allocated on the basis of the proximity of the child's home to school, (ie. Driving distance by road) priority being given to those living nearest to the school. (This criterion will be used to discriminate within oversubscribed criterion, except criterion 1).

The Board of Governors reserves the right to require such supplementary evidence as it may determine to support or verify information on any application form.

Admission to P2 to P7 is subject to the enrolment number not being exceeded and to any admission not being prejudicial to the efficient use of resources.

ARRANGEMENTS FOR ADMISSION

During the Summer Term 2017, children to be admitted to P1 in September 2017 will be invited to come to the school with their parents to meet the teacher and to be provided with additional information.
