Sickness in School

Should your child feel unwell in school, we will contact you to let you know and, if necessary, arrange for collection. Please contact Majella in the school office if your details change. It is also the policy of our school to make contact with parents should your child receive a bump to the head. It is then left to parents' own discretion whether the child stays in school or is taken? home.

If your child feels unwell in the morning, before school, please keep them at home!!

WHAT IS CONCUSSION?

A concussion is a brain injury which is usually caused by hitting your head or a fall. Concussions must be taken seriously. It is important to be able to recognise the signs and know how to respond.

If your child has been hit on the head or fallen, you need to look out for signs like these:

A headache

Feeling dazed or confused

Feeling drowsy or sleepy

Feeling sick Feeling 'irritable' or 'in a fog'

Having difficulty remembering things

Any other change in normal behaviour Concussion does not always involve losing consciousness; you must take any of these symptoms seriously.

The school adopts a 'Linguistic' approach to the teaching of Phonics. This approach provides Phonics. This approach provides children with strategies to help them problem-solve words for both reading and writing.

There are five principles that underpin Linguistic Phonics:

- 1. Sounds are represented by letters.
- 2. A sound may be presented by one or more letter.
- 3. same sound can be represented in more than one
- 4. Longer words are made up of syllables.
- 5. The spelling may same represent more than one sound.
